

## **Missouri Statewide**

Survey conducted January 31 through February 1, 2024. 741 likely 2024 Republican Primary voters participated in the survey. Survey weighted to match expected turnout demographics for the 2024 Republican Primary Election. Margin of Error is +/-3.3% with a 95% level of confidence. Totals do not always equal 100% due to rounding. Survey conducted by Remington Research Group on behalf of The Missouri Scout.

A lot: 14% Just some: 44% Nothing: 42%












